



If you have any questions or comments, please feel free to contact us.

Let me assure you that this issue was raised by a member of the staff of our office during a routine review of financial interests statements.

In researching the issue, we learned that your income as a participant in the program is derived from monthly retainers that are non-city source funds belonging to or administered by the city and not from outside organizations; pays you and from another belief that your concurrent service was approvediate under the ordinance.

This raised the issue of whether the interest you derive from participating in the program is considered "interest in city business" for the purposes of the Ethics ordinance. In a city department and an employee participate in a city program and an employer board of ethics, we noted that you during our review of statements filed with the whenever that payment is derived from city funds. 
