MINUTES OF THE MEETING COMMISSION ON CHICAGO LANDMARKS September 8, 2022

The Commission on Chicago Landmarks held its regularly scheduled meeting on September 8, 2022. The meeting was held virtually and simulcast to the general public via livestreaming. The meeting began at 12:48 p.m.

Chairman Wong called the meeting to order. He stated that in 2020 Governor Pritzker had signed Public Act 101-0640 making certain amendments to the Open Meetings Act so that the Commission was able to host virtual meetings during the COVID-19 public health emergency provided that certain conditions were met. One of those conditions was that he, as head of the Commission on Chicago Landmarks, determined that an in-person meeting of the Commission on Chicago Landmarks determined. Chairman Wong then made the determination – pursuant to Section 7(e)(2) of the Open Meetings Act – that an in-person meeting of the Commission on Chicago Landmarks was not practical or prudent. Chairman Wong also made a determination pursuant to Section 7(e)(5) that, because of the disaster as declared by the Governor, it was unfeasible for at least one member of the Commission or its chief administrative office to be physically present at the meeting place (inasmuch as there was no physical meeting place).

Chairman Wong then explained the emergency rules issued February 18, 2022, governing the conduct of remote public Commission meetings and provisions for remote public participation. In line with the emergency rules, members of the public were encouraged to submit written comments which were posted on the Commission's website. Statements by the general public for all agenda items would be heard at the beginning of the meeting and those wishing to comment were asked to use the "raise hand" function. Chairman Wong then called on those individuals to give their testimony before the commencement of the hearing on the agenda items as outlined in the emergency rules.

Maurice D. Cox joined the meeting.

Chairman Wong introduced and welcomed a new member of the Historic Preservation Division staff, Tyler Taylor.

Proposed building signage including new plaques, banners, and the refacing of existing canopies and awnings.

Action: Approved unanimously (3-0) with the following conditions:

- The signage package is approved as shown in exhibits dated 7/12/22 with the exception of the corner plaques, which shall be eliminated from the proposal. Mechanical penetrations shall be located within mortar joints wherever possible to avoid damaging the stone; and,
