

Facing Facts: Life Expectancy Gap

CHICAGO LIFE EXPECTANCY **DECREASING** FOR ALL RACE-ETHNICITIES EXCEPT WHITE, NON-LATINX



National projections estimate COVID-19 will reduce life expectancy in 2020 by 1.13 years, with reductions for Black and Latinx populations at 3 to 4 times that for whites.





Change process



HC 2025 Guiding Principles:

- **1- ANTIRACISM**: We actively challenge and redress racist systems through our process and strategies.
- **2-ASSET BASED:** We highlight community strengths as we tell our stories.
- **3-EQUITY FOCUSED**: We recognize that trauma affects all individuals, communities, organizations, and systems, and we support resilience and healing.
- **4-TRAUMA INFORMED:** We consider who benefits and who is burdened by our proposed solutions.
- **5-CAPITAL BUILDING**: We promote equitable wealth building, affordability and belonging.
- **6- COMMUNITY LED**: We make sure that community members, including youth, have power in decisionmaking.




EQUITY ZONE ACTIVATIONS


- Expand or maintain a neighborhood network
- Conduct assessments to understand challenges/opportunities in neighborhood health
- Establish, implement, and monitor the success of health and racial equity action plans
- Recruit, train, and deploy community members and trusted messengers to disseminate public health messages and improve health literacy
- Coordinate outreach, education, and engagement strategies to link people to services and build support for City-wide initiatives
- Implement systems to regularly collect, analyze, and interpret community health data;
 develop and execute a community-based participatory research agenda
- Identify and propose policy and systems changes that address barriers to health

EQUITY ZONES MAP

- Six Equity Zones, covering the entire geography of Chicago
 - North Central: Swedish Convent Hospital
 - Northwest: Northwest Side Housing Center
 - West: Rush Medical/West Side United
 - Southwest: Southwest Organizing Project
 - Near South: Greater Auburn Gresham
 Development Corporation
 - Far South: Phalanx Family Services
- Within Equity Zones, different community areas will be prioritized based on issue – starting with COVID vulnerability



EQUITY ZONE STRUCTURE



EXAMPLE: Near South Equity Zone

- 1 Regional Lead
- <u>Up to 16</u> Community Leads, each covering one or more neighborhoods in the region
- Each Community Lead coordinates a <u>hyper-local neighborhood network</u> of partners, including:
 - Other community groups
 - Health providers
 - Schools
 - Faith-based organizations
 - Businesses



HEALTHY CHICAGO EQUITY ZONES – Vaccine Strategy

Building on the successful Racial Equity Response Team and Protect Chicago Plus vaccine equity pilot, these efforts began with **community leadership of COVID-19 vaccination campaigns**, including outreach and engagement during 2021.
