Alderman Thompson asked for a summary on the department's radio project.

#### APPENDIX I

#### Cost

• This project will cost approximately \$40 million to complete. The OEMC has encumbered \$7.2 million to date on this project.

### **Project Phases**

- Phase I (2017): Initial Build
  - o Rebuild and replace current trunked infrastructure with modern consolidated core
    - In progress. Much of the infrastructure has been installed. Expected completion of this phase is December 2017.
  - o Add additional transmit and receive sites –
  - Add users from Midway and special police units
    - In progress. Midway is already on the air and in evaluation and testing phase.
- Phase II (2018): Coverage and Redundancy
  - o Expand coverage building 13 new sites
  - o Add units, including Police.
- Phase III (2019): Additional Sites/Users
  - o Add additional channels to focus on capacity
- Phase IV (2020): Coverage and Redundancy
  - o Extend coverage and add capacity
- <u>Phase V (2021)</u>: Users
  - Purchase additional radios,
  - o i dicitase additional radios,

Once complete, we will have citywide coverage with 30 channels (full capacity for a simulcast system).

#### **Project Acceleration**

• The OEMC could accelerate this project by approximately two (2) years (to December 2019/January 2020), but there is not a supportable funding mechanism to do so. Accelerating this project would require OEMC to identify \$25.6 million to be spent over the next two (2) years.

The attached information is in response to questions posed at our department's hearing on October 25, 2017 to discuss the proposed 2018 budget.

Alderman Lopez asked for information pertaining to the City's Emergency Operations Plan.

In compliance with Illinois Administrative Code 29 ILCS Part 301, the Chicago Office of Emergency Management and Communications (OEMC) and our stakeholder partners have developed and maintained the City of Chicago Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). The City is mandated to submit an EOP to the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) every two years in order for OEMC to remain an accredited Emergency Services and Disaster Agency (ESDA).

The City of Chicago EOP was most recently updated in 2016. The City of Chicago 2016 EOP outlines the following:

- Assigns responsibility to organizations and individuals for carrying out specific actions that exceed routine responsibility at projected times and places during an emergency.
- Sets forth lines of authority and organizational relationships and shows how all actions will be coordinated.

- Describes how people (including unaccompanied minors, individuals with disabilities, others with access and functional needs, and individuals with limited English proficiency) and property are protected.
- Identifies personnel, equipment, facilities, supplies, and other resources available within the jurisdiction or by agreement with other jurisdictions.
- Reconciles requirements with other jurisdictions

# The City of Chicago 2016 EOP format consists of:

- A Base Plan, which provides an overview of the jurisdiction's preparedness and response strategies; and
- Appendices or Annexes, which are individual chapters that address general strategies used for any emergency. The Annexes in the City of Chicago 2016 EOP include:
  - o Central Business District Evacuation Plan
  - o Critical Infrastructure and Key Resources Restoration
  - Communications
  - o Direction, Control & Coordination
  - o Emergency Public Information
  - o Firefighting
  - Medical Examiner Forensic Services
  - Human-Caused Hazards
  - Logistics Management and Resource Support
  - o Mass Care, Emergency Assistance, Housing and Human Services
  - o Natural Hazards: Extreme Cold
  - o Natural Hazards: Extreme Heat
  - o Natural Hazards: Extreme Storms
  - Prevention and Protection Activities
  - o Public Health and Medical Services
  - Search and Rescue
  - Technological Hazards
  - o Warning
